September Meeting

Hurricane Ivan created a lot of traffic for Baton Rouge. Because of the people evacuating and the possibility of Ivan coming to the state capital, the libraries closed down. With the library closed, the meeting had to be cancelled. I cannot remember if we have ever cancelled a meeting before -- certainly not in the last few years. So the planned iDVD demo has been rescheduled for this month. Hope everybody can make it.

AAPL.

What a month! Last month AAPL was fighting to maintain \$35 a share. At over \$45 a share AAPL can almost see \$50! To look at this in perspective, it has been 4 years since Apple stock was worth as much as it is now. Apple's Market Cap is over \$18 billion (just a few months back they were fighting to attain \$12 billion).

This is phenomenal news! So what drove the price up this high? First you start with the positive reception that the delayed iMac G5 received. This helped to gently ease the stock value up. The continued success of the iPod and the

iTMS also helped the elevator go up. The last big push was Apple's announcement of this quarter's earnings. Apple's net profit last quarter was \$106 million (2.5 times as much as the same quarter in 2003). Total revenue was \$2.35 billion (also an increase).

Apple shipped 836,000 Macintoshes last quarter (6% increase over same quarter last year). They shipped a staggering 2,016,000 iPods last quarter (up 500%)! Who would have believed that Apple would ship over 2 million iPods in one quarter? Rumor has that the iPods are due so improvements (higher

density storage). This should help keep sales up against the competition (SONY has started airing commercials for their competing product). Apple is looking good right now. The PowerMac and the iBook are selling at the highest rates ever. The iMac is looking like a winner. The PowerMac is clearly a workhorse that commands a part of the market. The X-Serves are continuing to sell. Not a bad apple in the bunch.

New iMac

Most reports about the new iMacs have been popular. The price/performance ratio is very nice. Many users are reporting good experiences with the iMac when things are less than perfect. The new approach by Apple to make it easy for customers to diagnose problems with the G5 iMac seems to be a winner. Many users are reporting good luck when working with Apple for repairs (possibly due to the more accurate diagnostics).

Cherry OS

Yet another time someone claims to have an emulator available to run Mac OS X on X86 systems with minimal performance loss. Cherry OS hit the Internet with a big splash. It now appears that Cherry OS (like all the others before it) is not a real product and will not be one anytime soon.

USB 2.0 vs. FireWire

Now that the new iMac comes with USB 2.0, many people are starting to compare USB 2.0 and FireWire. When things go right, USB 2.0 and FireWire 400 can perform at about the same speeds. FireWire is steady and generally seems to work. USB 2.0 speeds will plummet if you connect a USB 1/1.1 device to the hub. If you are planning on using USB 2.0 devices (some memory keys, card readers, ...) you should really consider getting a powered USB 2.0 hub for the USB 2.0 devices and a separate, powered USB hub for the older devices (keyboard, mouse, ...). Powered hubs are important for many devices that take power from the USB connection. Also (as mentioned in a previous newsletter), be aware that USB 2.0 compliant does not necessarily mean high speed. The USB 2.0 standard allows for high speed and low speed. When devices of various speeds are mixed, all devices drop to low speed. When a device is labeled USB 2.0, that merely means that it should work correctly when interconnected with other

USB 2.0 devices. Devices that are labeled USB 1 or 1.1 are not certified to work with USB 2.0 devices (but almost all do). Just make sure you use powered hubs.

Mac OS X Security Update

Apple released a security update for Mac OS X (10.2, 10.3, and server). As with other security updates, you should install this one as soon as possible. Seems like we had the same announcement last month?

iTMS

iTMS has sold its 150 millionth song. Customers are downloading approximately 4 million songs a week. At this pace, iTMS will sell 200 million songs this year. iTMS may not be a huge profit center for Apple but it is definitely the dominant online music store. iTunes for the PC has consistently been called the best music solution for the Windows world. All of these add up to more sales of iPods.

Apple Stores

When Apple entered the retail store business it looked a little crazy. The upscale stores with their high rent seemed to destroy any hope of them succeeding. Apparently this logic was faulty. One of the other contributing factors to Apple's good last quarter was the profitability of the Apple Stores. This month Apple unveiled the next step in the Apple Store adventure -- mini-stores. The new stores are smaller, carry all portables, the iMac, iPods and select 3rd party items. The PowerMac line is not present. The training theatre is absent. The mini-stores do include a Genius Barthough. At least six stores have already been opened.

30" LCD

Apple announced their 30" LCD and custom Nvidia video card with a lot of fanfare a few months back. Everyone was in awe of the quality and the price. Unfortunately, Apple had not been shipping any of them. Normally the bottleneck on new displays is getting sufficient LCDs of acceptable quality. It appears that Apple foresaw this problem and avoided it. Unfortunately, Nvidialet Apple down. Nvidia could not make working versions of the new video cards. The card is very similar to a model announced for the PC world. Nvidia has not been able to ship very many of the PC video cards either. It appears that they are starting to push the limits of their design technology. The good news is that people are starting to

report receiving their monitors and video cards. One customer wished for an alternate set of cursors that are larger so that it would be easier to find the cursor on the massive screen --- I would love to have that problem!

Dual Monitors

What do you do when you cannot afford a 30" LCD? You get multiple smaller monitors. Macintosh users have enjoyed this possibility since the Macintosh II originally shipped. The Windows world is starting to embrace the dual monitor approach. Slashdot (http://slashdot.org) included a link to a PC user who described his dual monitor experience. He said the first 2 days were a dramatic improvement in productivity. On the third day he figured out he could play a DVD on the second screen while trying to work on the first. I guess after the newness wears off he can get back to enhanced productivity.

.Mac Service

When Apple unveiled the .Mac service, it seemed a little pricey for e-mail and some online disk space. Apple has done a good job of adding benefits and features to .Mac (software, backup, calendar publishing, ...). .Mac started looking attractive when many of the free services disappeared. When Google Mail hit and other vendors upgraded their free offerings, Apple's ,Mac began looking dated. Apple has now doubled the default capacity to 250 MB for combined e-mail and storage. You can now divide the space between the two however you would like.



GMail

Google appears to be growing. One of their new expansion areas is GMail. GMail provides a free e-mail service with a GB of storage. Google hopes to change the way you process your mail. They are trying to see if their search engine technology can make it easy enough to find specific mail messages that you do not have to invest large amounts of time filing your e-mail. It might just work. The 1 GB of free storage has attracted a lot of attention. So I bet you want to know how to get an account of your own? Currently, you can only get an account by invitation from someone who has one and has been granted the ability to issue accounts (most who get permission to invite others have a limited number of invites). A very interesting approach. My account is traxler@gmail.com. And I do not have any invites yet.

Graphic Utility of the Month

With the holiday season rapidly approaching, everyone is getting out their camcorders and practicing to shoot another season of shaky home movies for the family to watch together. In the past, this consisted of grainy and soundless 8mm films and poor quality VHS tapes. Recently, this all changed with the advent of dvd creation software like iMovie and iDVD for Mac users. People started buying the latest firewire camcorders to start making high quality versions of the home movie. But there was one catch, you can't make copies of your dvd, only masters.

This was the case for all Mac users due to limitations in iDVD that Apple imposed to avoidlawsuits and royalty/trademark problems from people pirating purchased or rented dvd movies. PC users had many tools including DeCrypter, but Mac users were left in the cold until now.

Today, there are many cool tools available for dvd copying, recording and transcribing video formats. The best dvd copying program is Mac The Ripper, a program that copies all of the essence of the dvd and allows you to make an ISO disc image which can be burned by Toast or iDVD into a dvd. Sizzle is a dvd authoring program that works sort of like a simple version of iDVD. It takes mpeg2 video and allows you to create all of the chapters and menus like a dvd should have and then exports it as an ISO disc image. Mpeg Streamer is a program that transcribes mpeg video into different forms such as DV for use in iMovie or Quicktime. It works fast but requires the Apple Mpeg 2 codec/player to be purchased from Apple. VLC is a video/audio player that plays just about any av format available. Check for
