#### **December Holiday Gathering**

I enjoyed the chance to see some of you in December at Brewbachers. Being able to just attend a meeting and not worry about a presentation is nice. It is also great to have a chance to just talk and listen. I hope everyone had a great holiday and you are ready to start another exciting year in the Macintosh world.

#### AAPL

WOW!!! While this month's news is just like previous months, it is still amazing. Here are some high points: Yes, Apple set a number of new all-time high stock values again (maxing at \$86.38). Amazing. By the way, the day Apple announced the new Intel-based Macintoshes, they closed at \$80.86 (the first processor in the X86 family of processors).

Apple exceeded \$72 billion Market Cap at one point. Apple's value actually topped Dell! They are about equal right now. Considering that Dell is the number PC vendor, having Apple equal their worth is a big deal. Now Apple just needs to grow from 5% market share to closer to Dell's 30+%.

From a longer term view, Apple has come a long way. A little over 2 years ago, Apple stock was selling at about \$12 and the Market Cap was below \$6 billion. Since then, the stock has split twice and topped \$85. With the 2 splits taken into account, the \$12 price is more like \$3. From that perspective, Apple is worth more than 24 times as much in 24 months! Incredible growth.

So, Apple has had an amazing last couple of years. Apple is certainly poised for an even brighter future. Many analysts are now picking a \$100 target for Apple. The move to Intel looks like it might go smoothly. Of course, it could also tank. (but I sure do not expect it to). So, as I

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have said before: Get the sunglasses out -- the future looks really bright.

#### Microsoft Office

Apple and Microsoft have signed an agreement that commits Office development for the Macintosh platform for at least 5 more years. Details of the deal, have not be released (of course). I suspect that Apple has promised to limit their competition with Microsoft (maybe that is why Numbers has not shipped yet).

#### Intel Macintoshes

MacWorld did not provide every surprise that everyone suggested, but it was still exciting. And Apple proved me wrong on a number of fronts.

I expected Apple to announce the Mac-Mini and the iBook as their first Intel based systems (as did many people). Since the professional applications (Final Cut Pro, Aperture, ...) are not dual architecture yet, it seemed unlikely that Apple would impact the high end product line. It also seemed to make sense that Apple would not start at the top of the tree

So, Apple find a third option. They announced the consumer desktop (the iMac) and the professional laptop (PowerBook). In an interesting move, Apple has not discontinued the PowerPC versions of these machines. You can currently buy either version right now (most expect the PowerPC systems to be discountinued as more systems move to the Intel processor).

The Intel iMac includes several improvements over the PowerPC model. The Intel dual core processor is available at 1.83 and 2 GHz. Memory is now PC2 5300 (667 MHz) DDR2 (2 SODIMM slots -- like laptops). The video card has been improved to an ATI Radeon X1600 PCI Express video card with 128 MB of memory. This should produce much faster graphics. Prices have remained the same. Preliminary information has been pretty positive. Speed improvements of 2x to 5x have been mentioned. Real world experience has not vet had time to determine how the Intel iMac really  $compares the PowerPC \, model. \, The \, iMac$ now supports a external video connection that is not limited to mirroring. So you can now add a second monitor to the iMac. The iMac is currently shipping and some people have already received theirs.

The big surprise to me was the Mac-Book Pro (Intel based PowerBook). The new ProBook looks a lot like the current

PowerBook. And its dimensions are similar. The MacBook Pro is only available in 15" model right now at 1.67 and 1.83 GHz. It also includes two SODIMM slots using PC2-5300 memory (obviously very similar cpu boards/designs to the iMac [which probably explains why these two products were updated at the same time]).

The MacBook Pro has a single FireWire 400 port (no FireWire 800). The video card is the ATI Radeon Mobilibty X 1600 with 128 MB and dual link support (so that it can drive a 30" display). It also includes a built-in i Sight camera.

The big change on the MacBook Pro is the power connector. Since the first laptop, the power connector has been a problem. If you make the connection snug, you risk pulling on the cord and having it pull the laptop off the table. So most companies have made some attempt at a loose fit. Many attempts result in either poor longevity of the power adapter or damaging the power connector on the motherboard needing a replacement motherboard (Apple has seen their share of both sides). The new power connector fits into a small depression on the side of the MacBook Pro and is held in place by a magnet. This means it simply falls off with no damage if the cord is pulled. This idea will catch on like wildfire! Ideas like this are why Apple is an amazing hardware vendor.

The MacBook Pro will not be immediately available. Apple expects to start shipping in late February.

#### iLife 06

iLife 06 was announced (as expected). iLife gained another member - iWeb along with significant updates. iLife has become an excellent value.

I was surprised that Front Row and Photo Booth were not added to iLife. Not sure why. Mambe they are being with held to join the unannounced PVR software to produce a new product (iMedia)?

iWeb is supposed to make it easier to make web sites and blogs. iWeb seems to be based on the same basic engine as Keynote and Pages. It is template based (justlike they are). It is designed to make it easy to take content from the other iLife applications and publish it. We will have to see how it fairs as people use it.

Each of the other products have been updated to make it easier to publish information. Integrating into podcasts and

blogging has been made a lot easier.

Some quick items: iPhoto now supports up to 250,000 photos. iDVD now supports external DVD drives.

Several folks have already said that the new version is well worth the cost (\$79).

#### iWork 06

Numbers was not announced. Keynote and Pages both were upgraded. Of course Pages has new templates. It now supports 3D Charts and Tables with calculations and Mail Merge with the Address Book. It also has added Freeform Curves, Shapes and Masks.

This is beginning to sound familiar. Pages is growing. It is taing on some aspects of a spreadsheet and a drawing program. Almost like Pages is slowly growing into AppleWorks?

Keynote also gained features. In fact, many of the same features that were added to Pages were also added to Keynote. Both products made significant gains without making big headlines. I suspect the next version will be pretty neat.

#### iPod for Chrysler

Apple and Chrysler announced that future Chrysler products would feature integrated support for the iPod. Beyond merely being able to hear your iPod on the radio, the vehicles will be able to control the iPod via the vehicle audio controls. This is really cool. I hope more car companies partner with Apple (with 14 million iPods sold last quarter, the interest is very high).



#### Universal Binaries

Sometimes the past re-occurs. I remember when we transitioned from the 68000 processor to the PowerPC family. These two processors were very different. Apple undertook the process of translating all of their code from 68000 to PowerPC. When they did it, they decided to create a single executable that include the instructions for both processors. Conventional wisdom back then was sure the idea would not work.

But Apple did it. In fact they did it very well. For a number of years you could boot either hardware platform and run all applications.

This experience is obviously proving important for Apple. The new universal binaries include code for PowerPC and for Intel processors.

So far Apple has Mac OS X, iLife and iWork available as universal binaries. The professional applications (Final Cut Pro, Aperture, ...) are expected to be released as universal binaries by sometime in March. Since the MacBook Pro will have just started shipping, the paradox of shipping a profession hardware solution without the necessary software is not expected to be the case.

Many of the professional applications tend to take advantage of Altivec. Porting these applications to an architecture without Altivec is taking a little longer.

#### **BRMUG 2006**

It is time for another year. To the right you see the chart of the various presentations we did last year.

BRMUG's motto is *Helping Macintosh* users more effectively utilize their systems. I believe in this idea. I really enjoy trying to help.

Ineed to thank Don Ballard, Glenn Matherne and Richard Johnson for their support over the years. I also wish to thank each person who reads the newsletter and/or attends the meetings.

In spite of the Internet and the many wonderful books, I believe that the user group serves an important purpose. The nature of the Macintosh and Mac OS X does dramatically reduce the need of constant and ongoing support.

With the increase in the number of Macintoshes being sold to folks who do not know Mac OS X, the need for additional support is back on the upswing. These switchers are becoming a significant percentage of the Macintosh user base.

Over the years, BRMUG has changed to try to meet the needs of the users. We have changed our meeting location several times to adjust to the desires of the community. At one point, we produced sotware disks. We have
