AAPL

The financial news has not been exciting for the last couple of months. Apple is just barely above \$50 putting their Marker Cap at over \$43 billion.

Much of Wall Street was predicting that Apple was headed toward \$100 - what happened? It seems that many factors are working together to weaken Apple at this point.

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The PC industry as a whole is seeing a slowdown. Slowdowns mean less income. The iPod has had only 1 update this year. Everyone is waiting on the next great iPod. And Apple recently announced that major changes to the iPod are not likely to happen before January. Clearly this is not good for the bottom line.

While the MacBook Pro, the iMac and MacBook have been very successful, people are waiting for the rest. We all know that Intel based desktops are coming (may be announced at WWDC in early August). And everyone seems convinced that Apple will announce something else in the laptop realm.

Apple did decide to discontinue the eMac and introduced a education version of the iMac for \$899 (less memory, weaker video card, smaller hard drive, Combo drive instead of SuperDrive and no Bluetooth or Remote Control).

The new version of Mac OS X will be previewed at WWDC. As always, Wall Street seems to be afraid that people will not upgrade. By the way, iWork is once again rumored that it will game a spreadsheet.

Apple has dropped its lawsuits against the online sites that leaked information. And the Beatles case is pending appeal -- we may never have closure here.

Basically, Wall Street has noticed that Apple has not totally surprised the world in the last couple of months some new, astonishing product. And without that kind of magic, Wall Street gets nervous.

I still feel confident in saying that things will look much better by Christmas. I just have a feeling that Apple will have a good holiday and an amazing new year.

Financial Results

After the Stock Market closes this Wednesday (7/19/2006), Apple will announce its quarterly financial results.

Mac OS X Updates

Apple has released quite a number of updates and patches in the last month or so. Please make sure you are keeping up with the latest updates. Mac OS X is up to 10.4.7.

WWDC

The next WWDC (Apple's World Wide Developers Conference) will start August 11. Mac OS X 10.5 will be demonstrated at WWDC. Rumors are pretty strong that the Intel replacement for the PowerMac will be announced -- or at

least shown. We may also see the new version of iWork which is rumored to include a spreadsheet (again). If these big things actually happen, it might be just the medicine Apple needs to boost its stock price. And of course, with Steve Jobs doing the Keynote, you never know what might happen.

Virtual PC is Free (sort of)

Microsoft has now made Virtual PC available for free -- sort of. VPC for Windows is now free. For Windows only and you still need to buy (or own) a copy of Windows.

BRMUG ListServ Available

Periodically, I get asked if BRMUG has a mailing list/listserv. I have resisted the idea in the past. I receive far more mail a day than I can deal with. Many important message get far less attention than they deserve. I have been reluctant to add more e-mail to the over flowing stack that now exists.

I am also concerned about other people. An active mailing list could discourage people.

But time has passed. Most of us have developed techniques for dealing with massive volumes of e-mail.

And needs have changed. We need a simple electronic way to get the word out about upcoming meetings. We need a way for members to ask questions of each other. We need a way for club business and planning to be managed and recorded.

So we now have two mailing lists. To start with we have *brmug-l* and *brmug-planning. brmug-l* is meant to be a general purpose list that anyone can join and then post questions to or answer questions. The list is not for business purposes, but feel free to post requests for help (for pay or not). I will also send out a notice the week before and two days before the meeting. I will also send a message out when the newsletter is available online. If this list gets to active, I will create a separate *brmug-announce* list just for meeting announcements and important news.

brmug-planning is for the officers to communicate about club business and for club members to send ideas to. This list will have announcements of planning meetings and anything else that seems related to running the club.

Any member is welcome to join either list. You can also remove yourself at any time. You can choose to receive each message individually or to receive daily

collections. An automated archive exists of all posted messages.

To subscribe to the lists, please visit http://isaac.lsu.edu/mailman/listinfo and click on the list you would like to join. I will make every effort to prevent the lists from becoming spam distribution points (only members can post).

I believe that this is a good first step in merging BRMUG in to the e-mail world. Maybe it should have been done sooner, but it is here now. So, please sign up and lets see if we can utilize this new fangled technology.

Backing Up - Review

Last month's topic was Backing Up Your Macintosh. Here are some of the topics that were mentioned at the meeting.

First, it is REALLY important to have backups. While your Macintosh is valuable and very important to you, the data on your hard disk is much more important.

Before going on, lets consider what can happen: Your computer can be stolen. It can be destroyed by lightening. The hard drive can fail. A water leak can destroy it. Hurricanes. You can accidentally delete stuff. Maybe a young user of your system thinks it is fun to drag things to the Trash. And a million other things. The reality is that a lot of things can go wrong. Many that you might not plan for.

SO why did I say the data on the hard disk is more valuable than your Macintosh? While your Macintosh cost money and replacing will also cost a money -- it can be replaced. Some of the things on your hard disk can be easily replaced. Some cannot.

So what is on your hard disk that is



valuable? To answer that lets look at what your hard disk contains the operating system, software, configurations and documents.

The operating system is not a large loss. You can always buy another copy of this if you do not have your distribution disks.

Software -- this can be a little more bothersome. You should make backups (duplicates) of your distribution disks. These backups will make it much easier to rebuild or replace your Macintosh. For freeware that you have, it may be sufficient to have just a list of all applications on your system so that you could utilize http: //www.versiontracker.com to reacquire them.

And this gets us to another topic - what to do with backups? In the case of a home fire or a hurricane, it becomes obvious that storing backups somewhere other than at home. Various solutions exist: remote online sites, safe deposit box, a friend's home, at work, or an out of town friend/relative. For instance, if you periodically visit a relative in Dallas you might want to take a copy of your newest backups (with DVDs it should not take up much space).

So lets return to what is on your hard drive. The next item in the list is configurations. I spend a lot of time tweaking the settings on my machine. If I lost my system I would be very frustrated rebuilding my system. Much of this information is in your private Library folder and in the system Library folder. You may want to back these up (or at least the Preferences folder within the library).

And now we get to your documents. This is the real value of your computer. Your downloaded e-mail may not reside any where else. Your bookmark list might be something you consider important. The various documents you have offered (memos, e-mails, drawings, movies, etc) are almost impossible to replace without backups. And what about your pictures and music? If you are like me, you have used iPhoto to archive all of your digital photos. What if you lost all of these?

So losing your documents would be a bad thing. So what do you backup? The easiest starting point is your home folder. For many of this, that is a lot of stuff. In fact, it may be that you should approach it in steps. Backup your Music folder, your Pictures folder, your Desktop, your Documents folder and any thing else in there one piece at a time.

So how can you go about backing these up? Backups typically are done two different ways: full and incremental. Full backups are typically complete backups of the entire machine and/or some part (like the Pictures folder). Incremental backups are usually backups of items that have either changed since the last backup or since a point in time.

Full backups are nothing more than dupli-

cating a folder. This can be done by dragging and dropping. If what you are backing up an item that is bigger than your media, you will need to divvy this up into chunks that will fit your media. Disk Utility can be used to create a Disk Image of the appropriate size that you copy your files into. You can then burn that to your media (CD or DVD). By the way, Disk Utility allows you encrypt the image so that others cannot read the contents without the password. Be careful if you decide to do this. It would be shame to have a needed backup and not be able to use it because you forgot the password.

Incremental backups are a lot easier to deal with. Most of us do not create documents at high rate. You can take advantage of Find to locate all documents created or modified since a particular day. For most of us, a single CD will easily hold a week's worth of documents. If you buy CD-Rs in quantity (50 or 100) you can quite often buy them for less than \$0.10 each. At that price, most of can afford

to do weekly backups.

Iencourage people to do think about the information on your Macintosh. Design a backup strategy that matches the importance and the rate of change of your data.

Clearly it is useful to periodically make full backups (weekly, monthly, quarterly). It is also useful to keep incremental (or partial backups) a little more frequently.

Also consider taking a set of backups and keep them somewhere remote fro your home.

You should also remember that media deteriorates. You should periodically try to read your backup disks and make sure they are readable. You might even consider duplicating them ever few years.

That should get you started. Now all we need is a cheap, fast, large backup solution. Really. DVDs are only 4.7 GB. We need about 100 GB per platter.
