AAPL

Another month has gone by and Apple stock is up about \$2 from this time last month. So things are definitely looking up. Today Apple closed at \$88 putting their Market Cap at just over \$75 Billion. Here is a comparison of Market Cap for some folks:

Microsoft	\$269B
Walmart	\$200B
IBM	\$140B
Intel	\$111B

As you look at these relative values, and you think about Apple's \$10-15 billion in cash and short term investments you can get some strange ideas.

What if Apple bought Nvidia? Maybe Apple would be the big name in graphics at that point. Certainly the driver problems should get better.

What if they bought AMD? AMD has taken a beating over the last several months. They are ripe for takeover. AMD still has good chip designs and good processors. Their prices have always been good. Imagine Apple owning its own chip design and production company. And since AMD bought ATI, Apple gets an inhouse video card company as a bonus! Maybe the Apple and Intel partnership has lasted long enough. Imagine Jobs controlling AMD. Apple has plenty of fast and low cost processors to choose from. Maybe AltiVec re-appears in a future generation. Maybe Apple sells the chips at cost to Linux system providers so that Linux can erode the Windows market share.

What if Apple bought Dell? Wonder what Michael Dell would have to say about Apple then? Dell's facilities could become Macintosh assembly plants (if the quality control could be cleaned up).

The possibilities go on. Walmart is worth a lot of money. But how much do they have liquid? Could Apple convince them that fighting over movie sales is not wise?

Blockbuster and NetFlix are just over a billion dollars each. Maybe Apple should absorb one of them. Imagine every Blockbuster store becoming an iTunes store with iPods on the shelves also. Imagine the possibilities of adding iTunes Store's online presence to the Blockbuster rental dominance.

By the way, the stock price is up and the laptops are still due a speed bump (and maybe a major upgrade or addition). Quad core Mac Pros can not be far off. And the next version of Mac OS X is only months away. The LCD displays are due a revamp. The iPhone is still in the future. The iPod is way past needing to be shook up. The last time the iPod line was this stable Apple killed off the Mini and revamped the iPod to be followed by the Shuffle and the Nano. Lots of reasons exist for Apple to top \$100 a share by the end of the summer. It might just happen...

Software Updates

The last month or so has been busy for the Apple software folks. Updates for iTunes and QuickTime just came out. Of course the necessary patches for the change in Daylight Saving Time appeared. Java and the normal generic security patches were also released.

For a time when a lot of folks are focussed on getting Leopard out the door, Apple has been very busy fixing their current (and previous) software products.

Apple TV Delayed

The Apple TV should have shipped right about now. But it hasn't. Maybe the orders were so large that Apple is holding off on shipping until they can meet demand. Maybe they are waiting until iTunes updates are out so that the Apple TV will work flawlessly with iTunes.



Maybe production or shipping hit a snag. Maybe the software/firmware had a problem and Apple is having to correct it. No one seems to know but Apple is saying that the Apple TV should ship in the next 2-3 weeks.

New Laptop

My wife just got a 17" MacBook Pro and Parallels. The next month or so should be very interesting as I borrow her machine now and then to play with it. While the entire machine is simply nice, I really lust after the 180 GB hard drive. Laptop hard drives have come a long ways.

iLaunch

The Onion (http://www.theonion.com/) has a great article concerning Apple and its new product: Described in its patent filing as a "hype-generating mechanism with fully integrated Mac compatibility," the iLaunch is powered by Intel dual-core processors optimized to calculate a product's gravitas. Apple claims the iLaunch can garner the same amount of press attention as a major scientific discovery, high court ruling, celebrity meltdown, or natural disaster at 200 times the speed of a traditional media-fostered launch.

Microsoft News

Microsoft is in the news again. Documents for a court case have been found showing the Microsoft considered dropping Office for the Mac in primarily to hurt Apple. The documents go on to describe Office for the Mac as a great testbed for future Office enhancements.

DRM - Next Round

Maybe Steve Jobs went to far when he suggested that DRM was a bad thing at that he and Apple would drop as soon as they could (when the producers of content allowed them to do so).

His comments have certainly stirred the pot. A number of people have come out supporting the idea (some of the content producers). A few have declared Apple the "King of DRM" and referred to Jobs' comments as the kettle calling the pot black.

Some have pointed out Apple's insistence on including DRM on all iTunes products regardless of whether the production companies want it. It appears that the current implementation of iTunes is not designed to happily download non-DRM content. I am sure a future version will address this issue.



And then things got really funny. At a conference, some music industry executives blamed Apple's DRM for hurting the Industry. Apple has one of the simplest DRM systems in place.
