AAPL

Yet again we have had an interesting month. APPL set a new all time high at \$200 a share. As of this writing, they are down to \$184 a share with a Market Cap of \$161 Billion.

This places Apple (based on Market Cap) at 1/2 the size of Microsoft, bigger than Intel (\$150B), bigger than IBM (\$144B), 3/4s the size of Google (\$209B) and 3/4s the size of Walmart (\$191B). Clearly Apple has made it to a very significant place in value.

The next month or so is going to be interesting. When Apple releases their Christmas quarter sales numbers their stock should either go up or down substantially (depending on how the numbers turn out).

And then We have MacWorld in January to stir things up. New announcements may change everything -- or maybe nothing special will happen. Time to wait and see again. But it sure has been fun watching this steady

climb (other than the small bumps).

Baton Rouge Apple Store

Apple is scheduled to open a real Apple Store here in Baton Rouge early next year (March?). A quick Google search will yield all kinds of information. Here is a story the Advocate did: http://www.2theadvocate.com/news/business/12352351.html. We still have a few months to wait -- but this will be real cool!

Updates

Leopard was not a end -- just a new beginning for Apple. Numerous updates (including security patches) have been released for Leopard already. In fact 10.5.1 is already out. Apple really has been busy since Leopard shipped and it looks like lots more fixes and enhancements are still to come.

Leopard Solutions

If you are having trouble with some aspect of Leopard, I will once again refer you to http://www.macosxhints.com/ and http://www.macintouch.com/. Mac OS X Hints has a lot of Leopard Solutions. It is a great place to search or just browse. Macintouch has the latest news and lots of commentary from folks trying things on Leopard. Both are excellent resources.

Hierarchical Menus!

As many of you know, I was less than excited about Leopards new behavior with Dock Menus (Stacks). So far, I know of three "solutions" to Stacks. The solution I am using is called OldFolder (http://www.hawkwood.com/oldfolder/). OldFolder runs as an application (so it is in the top

part of the Dock. Other than that, its behavior is almost identical to the old way. A right click (Control Click) behaves just like it used to and provides a hierarchical menu. A left-click is different -- it brings up a file chooser window and lets you choose which folder it should be a shortcut to. It also keeps going down folders that have applications in them (so it is not much use for Documents).

So actually, it is a lot different -- but it is close enough to do what I need. At least for now.

Hierarchical Dock (hierdock/) is actually a little closer to what I want except that it uses right click instead of left click. I have a couple years of training to do a left click. I may eventually change to this one.

On Mac OS X Hints there is a hack to bring back the old behavior. I have thought a lot about doing this. It solves my entire problem with no new software (to consume memory). So far I have been reluctant to go this route (what happens with

I guess I am hoping Apple gives us a chance to have Stacks and the old behavior. If not, I will keep looking at alternative solutions (at least for a while). I am not ready to give up my use of hierarchical menus!
