At least now you do not have to fear sitting through an hour long sales pitch on insurance plans! But what are some examples of these other forms of insurance? Applecare is an obvious answer. Applecare extends your warranty for 1 or 2 years. Making backups of data is also another form of insurance. Keeping a copy at another site is also wise. February Meeting Review

William Sellers and I presented the topic *Leopard Revealed*. We covered lots of features that are in present in Leopard that most folks do not know about. Based on the questions that were asked, the topic drew a lot of interest.

AAPL

While times appear to be tough, Apple has actually had a pretty good month (same way last month started out). Apple almost made it back to a \$100 a share this month. Apple is pretty much maintaining

Last month Apple released upgrades to the Mac Pro, the iMac line and the Mac Mini. Last month, Mac sales were down. In reality, every time Apple does an upgrade, just prior to it sales are down.

Look below for a couple of positive announcements that might make this coming month turn out better.

New iPod Shuffle

Apple introduced a new iPod Shuffle this month. They have changed the form factor (again). It is even smaller. In fact, Apple has moved the controls from the Shuffle to the earphones (not enough room on the Shuffle for the controls).

The new model provides 4 GB (twice the previous Shuffle) in half the size for the same \$79. The new model adds a new feature -- speech. The new Shuffle reads the menus to you so that you can choose what to listen to.

Of note, many web sites have taken the new iPod Shuffle apart. In fact they found a chip that was assumed to be a DRM device to keep non-licensed devices from working with the new Shuffle. After almost 2 days of speculation, Apple officially responded that the chip is the encoder chip to communicate with the controls built into the earphone cable. They also said that the chip is not DRM. They would like companies to license the encoder chip via the Made for iPod program but they do not require it. Since Apple denies that the chip is DRM, companies are free to reverse engineer the encoding chip if they want to.

Hopefully, folks jumped to a wrong conclusion and Apple did not have a secret motive in mind. Regardless, the new "smart" earphones/controls will make replacements more expensive.

On another note, while it would be nice if Apple could drop prices (which they do sometimes) I am encouraged to see them continue the neat engineering designs. I am also impressed with their constant efforts to increase what you get (more features, more memory) for the same price.

iPhone 3.0

Talk of the next generation iPhone has been floating around the rumor sites for a while. Apple just hosted an iPhone event. It turns out that iPhone 3.0 is not a new iPhone -- it is a software upgrade for the iPhone and the iPod Touch. The upgrade will be free for iPhone users and \$9.95 for iPod Touch users.

The big item for consumers is that the new version will include cut-copy-paste functionality across the OS. At least that is the big obvious announcement.

A lot is also being made about changes for developers. iPhone 3.0 adds 1,000 new APIs. One new ability (for paid apps only) is the ability for purchases to be made inside the application.

Developers can also create apps that communicate peer to peer over Bluetooth. This could create a whole new category of apps. Apps can also communicate with hardware and finally Apple will support Push Technology. Hopefully this hardware communication will open the world of Bluetooth devices to the iPhone. Wouldn't be cool to use Bluetooth keyboards? Maybe even tether with you MacBook Pro while on the road?

For consumers, Apple is promising over 100 new features. A search feature will be added. Apple will support landscape mode for composing e-mail and text. Syncing of the Notepad is also promised.

The bad news is that we have to wait until this summer for the release of new OS. Developers should have immediate access to the new features so that they can start developing apps with the new APIs.

The iPhone has already been very successful. The iTunes App Store has over 25,000 applications and 800 million downloads. The SDK (Software Developers Kit) for the iPhone has been downloaded over 800,00 times. In 2008, Apple sold over 13.7 million iPhones (seems like I remember folks laughing at the idea that Apple planned to sell more than 10 million iPhones in a year. Wonder what it will be like after this summer?

iTunes 8.1

Apple released a new version of iTunes. The first change is speed. Apple says the new iTunes is faster at loading large libraries and syncing to devices.

Foxmarks, Safari, Xmarks

Foxmarks has been around for a while. It provides an online service to synchronize FireFox bookmarks. If you are primarily a FireFox user this is really cool.

Two things have changed. Foxmarks is branching out. It will support Safari and IE. The other is the name. Foxmarks is changing its name to Xmarks.

Using Xmarks is pretty straight forward. You visit their web site (<u>http://</u> <u>blog.foxmarks.com</u>/) and sign up for an account. You download their software that periodically updates the online bookmarks to match your browser's bookmarks.

If you are using a different machine, you can log into your account via the web and have access to your bookmarks.

This is not rocket science -- but it can be a great service. It is a simple answer to the madness that comes from using two (or more) machines with regularity. Check it out.

Safari 4.0 Beta

Apple has released a beta version of Safari 4.0. It is pretty cool. You can get it by going to Apple.com and clicking on Downloads. The ease of moving tabs within a window or between windows is great. The interface gives back a little space by merging the tab line with the top title line. many other changes also. I suggest you give it a try. Don -- you will love the coverflow-like interface option. Page 2
